Directive (2027)



WFD Review (41a) - By 31 December 2029 COM shall evaluate:

1. The effectiveness of the financial and organisational responsibility of the EPR for textile, including assessing the possibility of requiring a financial contribution from commercial reuse operators, in particular larger ones

2. The possibility of setting waste prevention, collection, preparing for re-use and recycling targets for waste textile

3. The possibility of introducing prior sorting of mixed municipal waste to prevent waste which can be recovered for preparing for reuse or recycling from being sent to waste incineration or landfill



EPR for textile, financial contributions

finance the costs of collecting, transport, sorting for re-use, preparing for re-use and recycling, and of the recycling and other treatment of collected used and waste textile, textile-related and footwear products

finance the costs of carrying out compositional surveys of collected mixed municipal waste

providing information to end users on the impact and sustainable management of textiles

reporting on separate collection, re-use and other treatment;


sorting and recycling technologies

supporting research and development for the eco-design of textiles that do not contain substances of concern

Collection

setting up collection systems for the collection of all used and waste textile, textile-related and footwear products and for ensuring that they are subsequently subject to sorting for re-use, preparing for re-use and recycling to maximise the availability of second-hand clothing and footwear and to reduce the volumes of textiles for types of waste treatment that are lower in the waste hierarchy

The collection network should be organised in cooperation with other actors active in the waste management and reuse sectors, such as municipalities and social economy entities.





Social economy entities

Social economy entities have a key role to create local, sustainable, participatory and inclusive business models and quality jobs

EPR support the activities of social economy entities involved in used textiles management


