Recent events

LAMPA 2020

With the encouragement 'the world is changing – we must continue the conversation!', the yearly democracy festival LAMPA opened in early September in a hybrid format. Various actors from both state and civil society offered interesting and inspiring discussions on some of the most important issues to Latvia, the Nordics, Europe and the world.



NCM Latvia hosted three panel discussions at this year's LAMPA-conference. One conversation on increased social and economic inequality was organised together with Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung. Discussions touched upon the increased tensions among groups of citizens in the Baltic-Nordic region and in Europe who perceive an unfair distribution of resources. Also, the state of the 'Nordic Welfare System' and solidarity were discussed. Morten Hansen, head of the Economics department at SSE and human rights expert Nils Muižnieks were among the participants. Watch the full conversation <u>here</u>.

Another conversation between media researchers and broadcasters aimed attention on "<u>How and why to demystify media literacy</u>?". The panel, which included Saara Salomaa from the Finnish National Audiovisual Institute, shared their interpretation on what media literacy is and discussed how we can think strategically about it in an era of artificial intelligence, 'big data' and 'capital surveillance'.

How does the future of food look like? We already know that the food sector has a critical impact on climate change and biodiversity. The discussion "<u>Future of foods</u>" addressed this topic with both optimism and scepticism. The role of technology was a recurrent topic

among the participants. Jesper Vad Holm, founder of Hereford Agro organic Farm, stated that "It [technology] can help farmers produce more food to a growing population and at the same time protect the environment and reduce food waste." On the other hand, technology can cause competitive problems.

The Danish Embassy participated together with Sate of Green, the Ministry of Economics of Latvia and the Latvian Wind Energy in a conversation on <u>the future of wind energy</u> in Latvia. Finn Mortensen from State of Green shared Danish know-how and experience on the topic and initiated a fruitful discussion on the future of Latvian renewable energy.



A dedication to Nordic literature: "The Book Flood"

On the 10th of September the opening of "The Book Flood" – The Nordics meet the Baltics in children's books, took place on the 7th floor of the National Library of Latvia. The exhibition offers playful games, interactive tasks, illustrations and prominent Nordic children's authors. The exhibition is a project supported by NCM Latvia and can be visited until Christmas, before it will tour the Baltics.



Danish Embassy's visit to Ogre

The Danish Ambassador made a visit to the city of Ogre on the 9th of September where he met with a school class to discuss energy, climate and environmental issues. The meeting was followed by a bike tour of the city by the city's mayor – to learn about the developments of the city. The visit also included the opening of the exhibition "Green

Together" at the Ogre Culture Centre – illustrating Denmark's green transition and how Denmark is dealing with global challenges related to the climate and the environment.



Swedish Embassy's project Never Violence

The Embassy supported and participated in Centrs Dardedzes conference on how to prevent child abuse, which took place 10th of September at the national library. The conference was well attended by Latvian officials, among them President Egils Levits – who gave an introductory speech.

The purpose of the conference was to find better ways of coordinating work against child abuse in Latvia and explore an opportunity for Latvia to become a 'path finding' country, which is a part of the End Violence Against Children initiative. Sweden demonstrated their experience in the field, by an inspiring digital speech by Ombudsman for Children, Elisabeth Dahlen.

Riga Photography Biennial 2020

The international contemporary art event Riga Photography Biennial are on display this month. The event is partnered by the embassies of Finland and Sweden and NCM Latvia and focuses on the archaeology of reality, while continuing to trace the development of image culture. Riga Urban Lab

Supported by the Danish Cultural Institute, The Riga Urban Lab named "Cultural Shift: Social innovation and cultural drivers" was held digitally on the 15th and 16th of September. The

goal of the two-day workshop was to explore when and how cultural drivers shift from being cultural actors to being social change-makers.

Baltic Sea Forum for Documentaries

The Baltic Sea Forum for Documentaries was originally held in Denmark but has since 2005 taken place in Riga. This year's event was held between the 1st to the 6th of September. The forum gathers professional documentary filmmakers from the Baltic sea region as well as Central- and eastern Europe to participate in various sessions and workshops. The Danish Cultural Institute in Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania has partnered the event for many years, and this year's programme also included films from Norway and Sweden.
